Sir Henry Royce Medal awarded to semiconductor specialist Dr Robert Hoye



SHRMF DEPUTY CHAIRMAN David Whale attended the Institution of Engineering and Technology (IET) Achievement Awards at Savoy Place, London on 24 October.

David is chairman of the Foundation Awards Committee and was proud to present the Sir Henry Royce Medal to Dr Robert Hoye (above left), a Royal Academy of Engineering Research Fellow in the Department of Materials Science and Metallurgy at Cambridge University. Dr Hoye's work is at the forefront of the discovery and scalable manufacturing of materials for clean energy conversion.

The Award is valued by the engineering and IT industry and enables the winner to highlight their achievements to future employers.

Dr Hoye is moving to Imperial College, London to take up a lectureship in the Department of Materials. This permanent position is associated with the Imperial spoke of the Royce Institute. Dr Hoye said: "The theme there is 'Atoms to Devices' and ties in with my work developing new semiconducting materials for photovoltaics that can tolerate material imperfections to be efficient when made by low-cost methods. Being part of Royce@

Imperial gives me a platform to showcase my work and forge new collaborations with partner Universities and industry. .

"The medal is an achievement many young engineers aspire to and will help me to secure funding to set up my future research group at Imperial. I hope the Foundation continues its partnership with the IET and continues awarding the medal to recognise excellence among young professionals."

We wish Dr Hoye all the best for his future career.



Speakers entertain at 2019 Heritage Weekend

THE HERITAGE WEEKEND on 16 and 17 November 2019 attracted an eclectic collection of speakers.

On Saturday John Brooks kicked off with an insight into Bentley Motors' return to racing (top left) and the way they upset the accepted order. Next came Malcolm Tucker on coachbuilders, with an extremely well researched and excellently illustrated talk through elegant car bodies from past decades.

Nigel Thorley (top right) followed with a detailed insight into the history of Jaguar Cars from its earliest inception to the merger with Land Rover. The day finished with Nigel and Colin Hughes recalling the history of the RREC which included an insight into the early years and the reasons for its formation – basically to ensure the preservation and restoration of cars which were already starting to be scrapped.

Nigel Thorley opened on Sunday morning with the history of Daimler, its merger with Jaguar and the parallels with the coming together of Rolls-Royce and Bentley. Ian North then took us on a hair-raising description of historic rallying in a Volvo Amazon with a sink welded to the roof. The weekend finished with Colin Hughes talking about RREC personalities of the past (above left). It was sobering to realise the number of names we had encountered and worked with.

The Foundation also held a sale of books which had been donated over the past few years. This raised £492 and our grateful thanks go to everyone who contributed. We also received the generous loan of an original Spitfire sales brochure and other literature from Giles Usher (above right). Our biggest thanks go to the speakers and all those who attended. Nightingale Road chimneypiece now standing in The Hunt House Library

ROYCE'S FACTORY in Nightingale Road, Derby was opened in 1908 and a new frontage, the Commercial Block, was added in 1912. This new building contained two identical offices with an interlinking door. One of these was Claude Johnson's office, the other came to be known as the Waiting Room. Each of these rooms had a fireplace with an oak chimneypiece.

Some structural alterations were made in the 1980s. These involved the removal of one (or possibly both) fireplaces. Rolls-Royce Ltd kindly donated one of the chimneypieces to the Foundation. For several years this was propped up in the Library at The Hunt House but when the foyer was refurbished the chimneypiece was installed there (pictured right). This has always been referred to as being from Johnson's office and a photograph of that room from around 1912 hangs above it (pictured below).

However, more recent research by the late Michael Evans of the Rolls-Royce Heritage Trust indicates that the second room

had been intended to be Henry Royce's office but the illness that forced him to work away from Derby meant Royce never occupied it.

It is logical that the two key directors should have had adjacent offices, and it explains why Johnson's office had a little-used room next to it.

It has not been possible to determine from which of the two rooms the chimneypiece at Paulerspury actually came.
